## **CHAPTER V**

## **CONCLUSION AND SUGGESTION**

## 5.1 Conclusion

Several conclusions on the analysis of language style in the novel Fellowship Point can be found based on the discussion and results in the previous chapter. There are thirty (30) data in this study. The data is analyzed based on Martin Joos' theory which classifies language style into five types, frozen style, formal style, consultative style, casual style, and intimate style. Each language style is identified and analyzed. And in conclusion, there are 4 types of language style found in the novel, namely formal style, consultative style, casual style, and intimate style, while none of the frozen styles are found. The types of language style that appears the most is the casual style which represents 13 cases, the intimate style is 10 cases, the consultative style is 5 cases, the formal style is 2 cases, and there are no cases presenting a frozen style. Researchers found that the use of language style occurs because of reasons and purposes in using language. These reasons are influenced by several factors such as social status, background, language forms, and functions. The function of language style in writing and society is almost the same. Because basically written works such as novels are a reflection of what happened in real life that happened in society. The function of language style for these two aspects is to show expression, respect, and feelings. The relationship between

language and society is due to the various styles of language which have various functions.

## **5.2 Suggestion**

Through this study, the researcher hopes that this research can be an overview of English literature study program students in analyzing the five styles of language with a more diverse range of other data sources such as news texts, magazines, films, or other sources. Moreover, researchers believe the findings in this study are far from being ideal. The object used in this research is only in the novel "Fellowship Point". The linguistic theory used is not very complete. The researcher recommends that future researchers can bring and discuss language style in research with more diverse objects and with broader linguistic theories.

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
